BACKFLOW PROGRAM

Remember fall is the time to get your backflow devices tested if you have outdoor irrigation, fire sprinklers that require backflow prevention or a heating system using a boiler. It is a State of WA requirement that all backflow devices be tested and verified yearly. This is to protect drinking water systems from contaminated water potentially being 'back flowed' into the distribution system and causing a public health threat. *Test results are required to be provided to the District* and we maintain a database of customer testing and back flow testers. Reminder letters are on their way!

EMERGENCY RESPONSEBUILDING A RESILIENT COMMUNITY

The District has an Emergency Response Plan (ERP) in place for a multitude of events that could potentially affect the distribution of drinking water. LFPWD is also designing 'mobile emergency water stations' that are in scale with our system needs, can be produced at a reasonable cost and functional for our community. These stations could provide drinking water at selected fire hydrant taps. After a major event, with good planning and appropriate response, water providers do their best to keep customers with water.

The District attended the Northshore Emergency Management Coalition (NEMCO) Emergency and Safety Fair on September 21st. At this event LFPWD stressed that residents should store their own supply of emergency water. In a regional disaster your family might expect to be without water service for three weeks due to damaged infrastructure. Common emergency advice is that you should store 1 gallon per person/day supply to last 1 week. This will eliminate the need to find, transport, filter, and then treat or boil your family's drinking water. The single best thing you can do to support your family after an emergency is to store supplies now.

PREPARE FOR WINTER NOW NO FROZEN PIPES!

Now is the time to cover and insulate outdoor spigots, put your hoses away when no longer needed. The most common time for pipes to split is at thawing time. During freezing weather, any frozen pipes should be thawed slowly and carefully.

WATER CONSERVATION TIPS

- ◆ Test your toilets for leaks
- One faucet dripping every second adds up to five gallons a day. Fix your drips!
- Now is time to plant native species. Plants have a much easier time acclimating this time of year and let nature do the watering!
