BACKFLOW PROGRAM

Remember fall is the time to get your backflow devices tested if you have outdoor irrigation, fire sprinklers a heating system using a boiler or other devices that require backflow prevention.

It is a State of Washington requirement that all backflow devices be tested and verified yearly. This is to protect drinking water systems from contaminated

water potentially being 'back flowed' into the distribution system and causing a public health threat. Annual test results are required to be provided to the District for our records. Our form contains further info and a list of testers and can be downloaded from www.lfpwd.org/backflow

HOME EMERGENCY PLANNING

Do you know how to shut off your water supply in case of a leak?

Do you have emergency water? All homes should consider having a supply of drinking water in case of emergency. It is estimated that every family member needs about a gallon of water a day during an emergency. Consider having 5 gallon containers of water stored with chloride tablets to last at least a week. Water should be kept in dark location and can be refreshed yearly as part of regular family emergency planning.

For those interested in reducing their water usage, there is some free help!

The LFP Rotary Club and the Shorecrest Interact Club (a high school club sponsored by Rotary) have teamed up to provide and install 50 WaterSense showerheads and 50 reduced flow faucet aerators in the District. WaterSense is an EPA program that provides specifications for high-efficiency plumbing devices. The water-saving devices will be provided by the regional SavingWater organization.

WINTER?



PREPARE FOR WINTER NOW - NO FROZEN PIPES!

Now is the time to cover and insulate outdoor spigots, put your hoses away when no longer needed. During freezing weather, any frozen pipes should be thawed slowly and carefully while monitoring for any leaks that may have developed.

- Outdoor hose bibs are susceptible to freezing, use an insulator.
- Know where your water shut-off valve is located
- Don't leave garden hose attached to the faucet in freezing weather
- Winterize your sprinkler system. Make sure your shut-off valve is off and irrigation lines are drained to prevent damage from freezing water.
- If you are vacationing during the winter, consider shutting off your supply to avoid potential flooding.



IMPROVEMENTS

McKINNON CREEK PUMPHOUSE PROJECT

Having completed the first phase of this project which consisted of underground supply infrastructure - piping and utilities, we are currently under construction for Phase II of



the project. The new pump facility building allows for a consolidation of control functions, water quality monitoring, and increased instrumentation. This project results in a major upgrade for the primary wellfield and distribution hub for the water district that will serve us well into the future. We expect to be completed in the Spring.
